# **The Great White Shark**

Great white sharks are the top of the ocean's food chain.
They are the biggest fish on our planet which eat other
fish and animals. They are known to live between thirty
and one hundred years old and can be found in all of the
world's oceans, but they are mostly found in cool water
close to the coast.

69 Even though they are mostly grey, they get their name
78 from their white underbelly. The great white shark has





Home Learning: Screen-Free Wellbeing Wednesday
