Key Question — What made Henry VIII so famous?

Key Achievements/beliefs

Church of EnglandBy breaking away from the Catholic Church in Rome, Henry was to create a new Protestant Church of England. The Great reformation stripped all the monasteries of their wealth, and a new way of worshipping God for people.MilitaryHenry helped to found the Royal Navy, as well as strengthening England's defences with fortifications along the coast, both of which can still be found tody.TudorUndoubtedly the most famous Tudor monarch, he furthered the House of Lancaster after his father had succeeded in defeating the House of Lancaster during the War of the Roses for the English throne.ChildrenAll of his children went on to rule England, the most famous being Elizabeth I, the first female monarch to rule the country.Pivine Right of KingsHenry was the first King to be ruler of Ireland, as well as England and Wales after he attempted to unite the country under his rule.LuxuryHenry was a man who enjoyed luxury, which meant he was constantly spending. He was famous for meeting the King of France, in a tent of Gold to demonstrate his wealth and power.
