



The Queen's Birthdays



The Queen celebrates two birthdays every year. Her actual birthday is celebrated on 21st April and her official birthday falls on the second Saturday in June.



Why Does The Queen Have Two Birthdays?

King George II began the tradition of two royal birthdays in 1748. He was born in November and he felt that the weather would be too cold for a birthday parade.

So, he decided to celebrate his birthday with a military parade, called Trooping the Colour, held every spring or summer. This tradition has continued ever since – no matter what month the king or queen was born. This is the monarch's official birthday.

Did You Know...?

There was no gun salute for The Queen's 95th birthday in April 2021. This was because The Queen's husband, Prince Philip, had died a few days earlier and The Queen was still in **mourning**.

The Queen's Actual Birthday

The 21st April (**The Queen's actual birthday**) is usually spent privately with her family and close friends. Around London, however, there are usually a number of gun salutes.

Gun salutes are a mark of respect for special royal celebrations and involve rounds being fired from large guns in royal parks. Gun salutes are usually fired at midday.

Other countries of the **Commonwealth** celebrate The Queen's birthday on different days of the year.

Salutes are not fired on Sundays so, if The Queen's birthday is on a Sunday, the salute will take place on the following Monday.

The basic gun salute is 21 rounds. In Hyde Park and Green Park, an extra 20 rounds are added because they are royal parks. There is a 62 gun salute at the Tower of London because it is a royal palace and fortress.




The Queen's Official Birthday

The Queen originally celebrated her official birthday on a Thursday but it was later changed to the second Saturday in June.

The **sovereign's** official birthday in June is usually marked with a famous parade called Trooping the Colour. The parade begins at Buckingham Palace and travels down The Mall before finishing at Horse Guards Parade.

It is a colourful celebration and thousands of people line the pavements of The Mall to enjoy the sight. For many years, The Queen rode her horse, Burmese, with her troops but more recently, she has ridden in a carriage.

Usually, members of the public line the streets to watch the parade while waving flags and cheering. Her Majesty returns to the balcony of Buckingham Palace to wave to the crowds that have gathered to wish her well.



In 2020, the parade was cancelled due to the COVID-19 pandemic and a much smaller version was held inside the grounds of Windsor Castle. In 2021, COVID-19 restrictions were still in place so a smaller version of the parade was again held in Windsor Castle.

The Queen's Birthdays

Gun salutes are usually fired at midday. Salutes are not fired on Sundays so, if the anniversary date falls on a Sunday, the salute will take place on the following Monday.

The Queen's Official Birthday

The Queen originally celebrated her official birthday on a Thursday but it was later changed to the second Saturday in June. Other countries of the **Commonwealth** celebrate on different days: in Canada, it is held on the last Monday before 25th May; in New Zealand, it is held on the first Monday in June and in most territories in Australia, it is celebrated on the second Monday in June.



The Queen's Birthdays

Trooping the Colour

Trooping the Colour is a grand parade on the sovereign's official birthday in June. The parade begins at Buckingham Palace and travels down The Mall before finishing at Horse Guards Parade.

Typically, flag-waving members of the public line the streets to watch the parade and the members of the Royal Family, who travel with it on horseback. Following the parade, The Queen returns to the balcony of Buckingham Palace to wave to the crowds that have gathered to wish her well.



In 2020, the parade was cancelled due to the COVID-19 pandemic and a much smaller version was held inside the grounds of Windsor Castle and at a safe distance from the Royal Family.

An announcement was made in March 2021 which said that the 2021 parade would not go ahead in its traditional form and arrangements for an alternative and smaller parade were again made.

The Queen's Special Birthdays

Her Majesty has been known to mark milestone birthdays with special breaks in tradition. On her 80th birthday in April 2006, The Queen went on a walkabout outside her royal residence of Windsor Castle and met with members of the public.

In 2016, to mark The Queen's 90th birthday there was, alongside the traditional Trooping the Colour: a service of thanksgiving at St Paul's Cathedral; a carriage procession of the Royal Family to and from Buckingham Palace and Horse Guards Parade; a balcony appearance of members of the Royal Family at Buckingham Palace and the Patron's Lunch (a street party on The Mall with 10,000 invited guests).



The Queen's Birthdays



The Queen celebrates two birthdays every year; one on 21st April (her actual birthday) and another, ceremonial affair on the second Saturday in June (her official birthday).

Why Does The Queen Celebrate Two Birthdays?

The tradition of having two sovereign birthdays dates back to the reign of King George II in 1748.

He was born in November and he felt that the inclement weather of the season could have a negative impact on an annual birthday parade on his actual birthday.

A solution to this was to celebrate his birthday with a military parade, called Trooping the Colour, held every spring or summer when there is an increased likelihood of more pleasant weather. This tradition has continued ever since – no matter what month the king or queen was born. This is the monarch's official birthday.



Gun Salutes

Gun salutes are a mark of respect for special royal celebrations and involve rounds being fired from large guns in royal parks.

Gun salutes are usually fired at midday. There is a 41 gun salute in Hyde Park, a 21 gun salute in Windsor Great Park and a 62 gun salute at the Tower of London.

Salutes are not fired on Sundays so, if the anniversary date falls on a Sunday, the salute will take place on the following Monday.

The Queen's Actual Birthday

The 21st April (The Queen's actual birthday) is usually spent privately with her family and close friends. Around London, however, the occasion is usually marked by a number of gun salutes.

The Queen's 95th birthday celebrations in April 2021 were a more subdued occasion. Following the death of The Queen's husband and consort, Prince Philip, on 9th April 2021, The Queen was still in a period of official mourning (the expression of sorrow following a person's death). As a result, The Queen's birthday passed without a gun salute.

The Queen's Official Birthday

Earlier in her reign, The Queen celebrated her official birthday on a Thursday but it was later changed to the second Saturday in June.



Trooping the Colour

Trooping the Colour is a grand parade of soldiers, horses and musicians to mark the sovereign's official birthday in June. The parade begins at Buckingham Palace and travels down The Mall before finishing at Horse Guards Parade. Typically, flag-waving members of the public line the streets to observe the parade and members of the Royal Family, who travel with it on horseback. Following the parade, Her Majesty returns to the balcony of Buckingham Palace to wave to the crowds that have gathered to wish her well.

Trooping the Colour originated from traditional preparations for battle when a regiment's colour was carried, or "trooped", down the ranks so that they could be seen and recognised by the soldiers who could identify their fellow troops easily on a battlefield.

In 2020, the parade was cancelled owing to the COVID-19 pandemic and a scaled-down version was held inside the grounds of Windsor Castle and at a safe distance from the Royal Family. An announcement was made in March 2021 which stated that the 2021 parade would not go ahead in its traditional form; an alternative and smaller parade was held again.

Other countries of the Commonwealth celebrate on different days: in Canada, it is held on the last Monday before 25th May; in New Zealand, it is held on the first Monday in June and in most territories in Australia, it is celebrated on the second Monday in June.

The Queen's son, Prince Charles, is the next in line to the throne and it is possible that he may continue the tradition of having an official birthday; his birthday is in November which (as King George II established) is not an ideal time of year for a military parade!

Milestone Birthdays

Her Majesty has been known to mark milestone birthdays with special breaks in tradition. On her 80th birthday in April 2006, The Queen went on a walkabout outside her royal residence of Windsor Castle and met with members of the public.

In 2016, to mark The Queen's 90th birthday there was, alongside the traditional Trooping the Colour: a service of thanksgiving at St Paul's Cathedral; a carriage procession of the Royal Family to and from Buckingham Palace and Horse Guards Parade; a balcony appearance of members of the Royal Family at Buckingham Palace and the Patron's Lunch (a street party on The Mall with 10,000 invited guests).
